

Our recent trip to Moscow - of which you just might have heard!! – took us to new places and exposed us to different thinking,



other life-styles, and offered fresh eyes on the familiar world. The Russian way of telling the story, their take on the news, their analysis of the political landscape, was very different from the received wisdom in the West, and their understanding of how things had come to be as they are, offered a slant little heard down our way!

The rights and wrongs of historical interpretation, and responses to unfolding situations, might vary according to perceptions and prejudices, but this much was clear to me...people are people! 

– Finance Update, February 2022

The main question most people have at the start of the year regarding finances is usually, how did things turn out last year? Of course, the big disappointment for a lot of people is that at this stage, the answer, if you're cautious, is to say that we don't really know. This is because it takes a bit of time to close out all the accounts, reconcile the accounts payable and receivable, and carry out a bunch of other functions which are as equally thrilling and interesting to most



members of the Congregation as the prospect of watching a live-action television documentary on paint drying.

The final picture will be presented later this year to the Annual Congregational Meeting when it meets to (among other things) approve the audited accounts. Nonetheless, the big picture is essentially there and it looks reasonably encouraging. Right now, the Church is actually showing a small surplus, which is an amount of income received in excess of the expenditures. This will inevitably be reduced once a few, final invoices from 2021 are received but it does mean that the Church essentially broke even in 2021. Given the impact of lockdown until the last third of the year and the fact that 2020 had resulted in a substantial deficit, this is a source of what I could describe as, "encouraging relief". The Church had actually budgeted for another large deficit but this has been avoided which is very good news. I would hasten to add that a bigger surplus would have been ideal since a breakeven point still leaves us vulnerable, but at least we can move forward without having to dig into reserves.

In this regard, the Congregation is to be highly commended in how it responded to the situation in 2021. With Church Services in the Auditoire only re-starting in September and with quite limited numbers attending, the Congregation has carried on supporting the Church generously with bank transfers and online donations. Some very generous donations have been made and the huge response to the virtual Church Fair meant that it actually raised an equivalent amount to what a regular Church Fair would have earned pre-COVID.


Other developments are also encouraging. Work has been ongoing to boost income sources and significant progress has been made towards getting an online income function onto the Church website. You may not realise it but there have already been healthy contributions received via a central Church of Scotland account for online donations which were directed to Geneva. Our own presence in this environment should be a strong step forward. Another strong development has been the assumption of the role of Freewill Offering Treasurer by Mak Ikeda who is bringing some new energy into the role as it moves back to being a combination of physical donations and bank transfers. Mak has revived the pink and blue envelopes and encouraged as wide a registration as possible in the Freewill Offering scheme. If you haven't joined yet but would like to, please get in touch with him at <u>fw.treasurer.cos.geneva@gmail.com</u> or just talk to him on a Sunday if the internet is not such an exciting prospect for you. All are welcome in this place for sure.

And that would be a good point at which to conclude. The point is that the Church has kept going through difficult times and is taking new steps forward to support its work thanks to the generosity and dedication of its Congregation. If you look at the names filling up the Freewill Offering scheme, the dozens of bank transfers, and the kind contributions made on a Sunday offering plate, it is clear that there is real commitment to the Church and even in the less spiritual realm of finance, this coming together makes a visible and valuable difference.

Our Mission Programmes

We maintain ongoing links with outreach programmes in two of the world's poorest countries. In Malawi, our connections are with the Youth HIV-AIDS Information Centre at Ekwendeni mission hospital in the north of the country, where Shupo Kumwenda is the supervisor (Shuporvisor?). And in Nepal, our Elder Graeme Clugston and his Nepali wife Meena have served for the past 14 years as Medical Director and Head of Nursing Services in Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital and Trust, a Christian foundation in the south-east of a Buddhist and Hindu country. We provide them both with basic support and, on occasion, emergency financing when particular difficulties occur (earthquakes, tropical storm damage, etc.) In Nepal, our congregation has also generously funded the construction of a children's ward and an isolation ward, and individual members have given substantial donations to buy important medical equipment. In Malawi, we have paid for the building of an outdoor meeting hut, enabled the Centre to buy a pickup truck and supplied bicycles for outreach work.

Jane and Han Broere are our main contacts with Shupo in Ekwendeni, also via their school feeding programme "Nourishing Minds". With the Covid pandemic it has unfortunately not been possible to visit Malawi for the past two years but they hope to make a trip later in 2022. In the past, we have also welcomed people from the Youth Centre here in Geneva – including Shupo – both in summer and in winter!

Graeme and Meena keep regularly in touch with newsletters from Lalgadh and were recently able to take some leave in the Geneva area – it was great to see them looking so well and participating in Auditoire worship.

The regular budgets for both programmes approximate to CHF 12,000 per year. In Nepal, our basic support pays the salaries of a doctor and a nurse. In Malawi, we finance the salaries of Shupo and two other staff members, and administration expenses. Our contributions are the only financial support for the Youth Centre and provide Shupo and his team with the foundation for their work in villages such as distribution of clothing, wheelchairs etc.







Both centres have major outreach programmes.

Ekwendeni's youth spread the message of AIDS prevention, treatment and healthy living throughout the local area via village visits, band concerts and many other activities; they also help poor families with housing, access to medical care, and maintain a large number of village vegetable gardens.

Sport is also a major outlet for the energies of young people and has become highly successful; a number of the Ekwendeni female netball players were selected for training with the Malawian national squad. One of their special projects for 2022 is the reconstruction of the netball court – an essential training facility; the estimate is that this will cost the equivalent of CHF 1500. On the young men's side, the football club is also having big successes at the local level.

Lalgadh hospital, which offers free leprosy treatment to all patients and is also a very busy general hospital, works with many poor villages in very difficult terrain - mountainous roads, often washed away by floods, either very hot or very cold. Recently they have completely rebuilt a school in one of the most inaccessible districts – sending back dramatic photos of the journey and the building process.

Support for our mission outreach can be given either by direct donations to the church bank account or through the "Freewill" offering scheme, either by bank transfer or via the blue envelopes to put in the offering plate each Sunday. We encourage you to be generous and continue your wonderful encouragement for these two excellent programmes, helping people in two of the world's poorest countries.


