

#### **Letter from the Minister**

There comes a moment...in the middle of the procedure, the agendas, the minutes, the reports, the deliverances, the notices, the technical hitches...there comes a moment, when all these things are forgotten, and we remember why we are there, what we are about...what this whole astonishing, frustrating, wonderful business of being a Christian, serving in the church, being the church is all about.

For me, at the Presbytery meeting last week in Rotterdam, it was during the Sunday Morning Service...the longest I think I have ever attended...two hours plus...(there was an Ordination, a Setting Apart – special singings, appreciation shown for so many people) but, in the midst of it all ...at the heart of it all – explaining the heart of it all...we sang that wonderful hymn *I, the Lord of sea* and sky - with its haunting question...who will go...who will bring my love to them...who will tend the hurting and the broken!

And the reply, "Here I am Lord! Is it I, Lord...I have heard you calling in the night...

I will go Lord - if you lead me, I will hold your people in my heart"

Never mind the baloney, the pressures, the times when we get it wrong, or don't get it at all...**This**, I thought, **this**, I felt...is where I want to be...and these are the people I want to live my life alongside...walk alongside, and have walk alongside me.

Untidy pilgrims, shabby tigers, by no means always getting it right...myself as much as anyone...

But this is the Church! This is the Church I am honoured to be part of, to serve in, and to be nurtured by.

Nothing else will do.

Nothing else will do.

Here I am, Lord. Is it I, Lord?



#### <u>Finance Update - September 2022</u>


Since 2013, our Congregation has recorded a deficit in 6 out of 10 years. 2021 would have been the seventh had it not been for a very generous, one-off donation. That means that we've been running a deficit for basically two out of every three years.



A deficit, put very crudely, means that we're spending more than we have. We can't make ends meet. The reason we've got away with this up to now is because we still have reserves but these are dwindling. This is reflected by the constant drop in the level of our net assets.

Our net assets are just that – the sum of the assets which we hold (which for Geneva basically means the worth of the Church's two bank accounts), less any outstanding bills or other commitments to be paid.

In the Canton of Geneva, a charitable entity is supposed to be able to maintain itself for a year with the resources it holds. The timeline may be relaxed but even if reduced to six months, it would not do much to change the following analysis. In our case, the basic measure of this is to consider whether our net assets exceed our expenditure levels in the financial statements, presented and approved at the Annual Congregational Meeting each year. Taking a straight line trend shows the following:



What the graph shows is that unless current trends change, the Congregation will reach a point where it can no longer continue functioning around 2029 – 2030. There will be no need to worry about finding a new Minister, because we won't be able to afford one.

#### So what can be done?

To make things clear from the outset, the problem is not our Congregation's generosity. Our members are giving at least as much as they ever did. The mathematical reality is that there are fewer of us. The fall in our financial worth is simply symptomatic of a fall in numbers. It's just that the financials will take down the Congregation if their fall is not checked and reversed. At the same time, we have to

address the wider problem. There isn't much point to staying financially solvent as a Church if fewer people than ever before are actually worshipping. So raising money is only part of the solution. We need to do it the right way.

Both the Kirk Session and the Congregational Committee are aware of the problem, and now you are too. What is needed is a financial boost, but this needs to come from a variety of sources which are designed to grow our Congregation. Vibrant Congregations do not tend to go under financially. We cannot lose a financial focus, but the broader strategy has to be to build up the Church.

Now is the time for action.

Strategic action plans are already being drafted and circulated by members of the Congregational Committee. These involve a range of activities designed to put our Congregation back on the map of international Geneva. A decade or two ago, we used to communicate ourselves through a wide range of means. Nowadays, has anyone heard of the Church of Scotland who moves to Geneva for professional reasons, through integration services provided by international organizations or private companies? Are all the expat websites aware of who we are, where we are and what time our services take place? Are local hotels taking flyers with our details? Do international spouses looking for somewhere to engage with others in English find that there's a Church offering social engagement, help with children or just someone to talk to? These are just some of the opportunities which we could explore. We could also ensure that those who suffer bereavement can find the services and support they need in the English language and the Presbyterian tradition. That just needs us to alert local undertakers to our presence. Similar things could be done with regard to marriage parlours and services. If we build up our engagement with the community, perhaps more people will become aware of our presence, find that they would like to be worshiping with us, and providing both the numbers and the resources (of all sorts) which we need to keep going.

The good news is that things are moving. As well as putting together coherent strategies, we also have members of the Church working on outreach through the hospitality sectors, online, with local undertakers and in partnership with 121 George Street's Stewardship Committee. I hope that's just the beginning. There's a volunteer sheet at the bottom of this article where you can see several of the jobs which need to be done. These are just suggestions which need to be addressed. More can be added. Please feel free. Just let me (<a href="mackenzieje@hotmail.com">mackenzieje@hotmail.com</a>) and/or Nan Braunschweiger (<a href="mackenzieje@hotmail.com">ntbraunsch@bluemail.ch</a>) know so that we can coordinate who's doing what. You can respond by email, online or by just giving us a hard copy.

Some of these jobs need quite a time commitment, some very little. The critical thing is to get as much happening as possible across as wide a spectrum of our membership as possible. So the question to each of us is simply this: what can I do and what will I do?

#### **VOLUNTEER SHEET – INVESTMENT IN**



As at the end of August 2023, the financial situation of the Church of Scotland Geneva does not look healthy. Comparing the Church's net

value against its expenditure needs, an extended projection indicates that the Church will not have enough funding to continue beyond 2030.

The Church itself does not, of course, exist to earn money but the level of its finances is indicative of the level of its Congregation. It is not that people are any less generous than they used to be (in fact, they are probably more so), but that there are fewer of us in the Church.

Not enough people means not enough money as well and taken together, that means no Church.

Addressing these concerns needs to be done together. If we can build up our Church, history indicates that its financial situation will improve as well. There is no competition. At present, there seem to be plenty of opportunities to communicate to the wider world that there is a Church of Scotland in Geneva, that it is a vibrant community and that it welcomes all who come. The challenge is to get that message out there.

This call for volunteers has identified some things which could be done. They are not necessarily time-consuming or demanding but if we all undertake something, perhaps we can turn our current situation around. This is not a finance initiative per se, it has simply been put forward by those with an eye on the financial situation. We therefore call for everyone who can to put their name next to something. New ideas are all welcome as well.

### **Report of session**

The Kirk Session continues to meet every sixeights weeks.

Important topics discussed include the 'deferred' linkage with Lausanne. The final document has been approved by the Session

and it now needs to have the approval from Presbytery before being sent to Edinburgh. It appears that both congregations will be able to call a minister. One minister will be from the Church of Scotland and the other Associate minister can be from another denomination. The wording of the final document makes it clear that there will be no distinction between the two.

Presbytery remains an important subject and Jane Broere has been appointed as Presbytery elder. She will accompany the minister to Rotterdam. Laurence is still interim moderator for the congregation in Paris and has recently returned from a Local Church Review in Rotterdam.

The financial situation of the church is particularly disturbing as we are running a very large deficit. The Congregational Committee and the Kirk Session will be holding a meeting involving the wider congregation to discuss how best to manage the situation.

Safeguarding is an important topic and Christine Colliar has been appointed Coordinator.

The Sunday school is thriving under the leadership of Cornis Van der Lugt. The choir is also growing with Paraic Reamonn and a service of Nine Lessons and Carols will be held on 17 December.

New elders are being actively sought and Christine Colliar and Mark Jeffries will be ordained on 29 October.

#### **Mission Committee**

Warm thanks to all for their unfailing support for our two Mission partnerships in Ekwendeni and Lalgadh. Thanks to a recent, generous donation we are once again in a position to provide ongoing support to the two programmes.

Since the beginning of 2023, we have made two contributions each of CHF 6,500 to Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital Trust, and In February and May we sent two donations to Ekwendeni, the last one, of CHF 7,500, intended to cover normal expenses up to end-January 2024.

We hope that the forthcoming concert on Saturday 28 October at 6 p.m. in the Auditoire will not only be highly enjoyable, but also help to further consolidate our support for the mission partnerships. Please give it your support!

Mission giving is separate from the normal Church budget. Mission income and outgoings stand alone each year, and we cannot spend more than we receive.



For some time now, we have been very worried about the state of health of Graeme Clugston, and whether he may be able to return to work in Nepal. A recent email from Graeme gives hope that, subject to the results of a very recent full-body scan, he and Meena may be able to return to Lalgadh around the end of October.

There is excellent news from Shupo in Ekwendeni. Netball is a big sport at the Centre and just recently the girls' netball team qualified for the national finals, which will be held in late October in Lilongwe. We have agreed to support the team's travel, accommodation and other needs during their Lilongwe stay and wish them all success.

We are very happy that the Partage appeal at Harvest time was so successful, and that the Church has agreed to continue this on a monthly basis for a six-month trial period. A list of "Partage" goods is contained in this Newsletter and you are invited to bring goods to church on the first Sunday of each month.

We have two new members of the Mission Committee, Rosemary Antas and Paraic Reamonn. They are warmly welcomed and we look forward to their stimulating contributions.

#### **Cursillo November 23**

#### Taking it to the next level

In *You've Got Mail* (1998), Kevin (Dave Chapelle) explains to Joe (Tom Hanks) his philosophy of relationships:



"You're taking it to the next level. I always do that. I always take a relationship to the next level, and if it works okay I take it to the next level after that, until I can finally get to the level where it becomes absolutely necessary for me to leave."

Cursillo ("A short course") is for those who want to take their relationship with God to the next level (and we hope you won't leave).

Cursillo began in Mallorca in the 1940s, among lay Catholics who wanted to understand their faith better and – more importantly – to live it better. It met a felt need and spread rapidly beyond Spain, beyond Europe – and beyond Catholics. In Geneva, it has from the beginning been ecumenical, involving English-speaking congregations from Catholic to Baptist and Evangelical, with middle-of-the-road congregations like ourselves somewhere in, well, the middle.

This year, the Geneva Ecumenical Cursillo Community celebrated its 40th anniversary, so it must be doing something right.

What is Cursillo? It's a short course over a long weekend (Thursday evening to the final party on Sunday evening), in which the participants get a chance to laugh and pray, to worship and have fun, to walk the way of the cross, and to talk together about their faith in ways that most of us rarely do.

Friends are made, often across boundaries we seldom cross. At its best, it can be life-transforming.

The Cursillo weekends in Geneva take place twice a year in the serene setting of Le Cénacle (<a href="https://www.cenacle.ch">www.cenacle.ch</a>), Promenade Charles-Martin 17, CH-1208, Genève.

The next weekend (Cursillo #76) is November 9-12.

### **Greetings from Blantyre, Malawi**

During a recent visit to Geneva, Max and Isabel Phiri visited with us at the manse to update us on their "retirement" in Southern Malawi.



Upon our return home in January this year, our church, The Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (Blantyre Synod) asked me to be VC of University of Blantyre Synod and Max is the Dean of the Faculty of Commerce. It is a new University. Only accredited by our National Council of Higher Education in 2021. Our website is in the process of being updated.

We have three faculties: Education, Commerce and Theology with a total of 79 students. We are mainly offering undergraduate programmes except for theology where we have started with Masters of Arts in Theology. We have applied for registration of a Bachelor of Arts in Theology.

Max and I commute from Zomba to Blantyre to run the University. The work we are doing is far from what we had planned to do in our retirement. We have come to recognise that this is the case of Proverbs 16:9 which in New Revised Standard Version says: 'The human mind plans the way, but the LORD directs the steps'. We are finding fulfilment in knowing that this is our calling from the Lord after working outside Malawi since 1996.

We are discovering anew that despite high levels of corruption and poverty in the country, the church has remained vibrant, ministering to each other and especially the needy. Our university is a true reflection of that. Located within the beautiful Blantyre mission which was established by the Church of Scotland in 1876, we are blessed with beautiful old buildings. The university is currently housed in the Hetherwick house. Recently the Henry Henderson Institute Secondary School has been moved to another campus and it's buildings built in 1919 have been given to the University of Blantyre Synod. This is a sign of a vision of growth for the university. We are excited because we also see potential for growth. At the same time, we are faced with the challenge of renovating the once beautiful buildings. As is the case with the rest of the country, we are yet to develop a culture of maintaining old buildings. We find it easy to elect new builds rather than renovate existing buildings. As a church historian, I have chosen to renovate the old missionary buildings.

Please come and visit us and see the beautiful Blantyre Mission station. As God moves you join us in renovating the old buildings. Priority is given to the hostels for needy students especially girls hostels. Max and I are visiting the Blantyre Synod congregations asking them to join hands with us in the renovation project. We intend to name the buildings after the congregations or individuals who have given contributions for renovations. Please let us know if you want to receive the university newsletter which provides regular updates on the university development.


