



Letter from the Minister

My mind is in a whirl! Things I've read, people I've met, situations that have arisen, duties to perform...

I've just read a wonderful book by Richard Holloway – "Waiting for the last bus" – which, as you might guess, is a reflection on the way things are going for him as he reaches eighty years of age and thinks how to deal with that interesting and challenging stage of the journey. Beautifully written and powerful, it moved me to tears. Recommended!



Lindy will tell you that I am often moved to tears – by beautiful moments of reconciliation and healing in dramas on screen, or stories of redemption - when someone has reached out in compassion and lifted someone up, given them hope, a second chance.

I was, of course, moved to tears at the funeral last week of my wonderful sister, Lorna. The remembrance of her courageous loving life, and the experience of meeting person after person who was so eager to tell me how kind my sister had been to them, or how she had found time to listen to their story and followed up on that connection with loving thoughtful action...I was proud of her and humbled by the effect for good of her life. She never rated herself very highly – yet the effect of her life of faith and love was deeper than any of us ever knew. A true daughter of encouragement and a real follower of her Lord.

Some of the tears of that day came from being surrounded by Christian people and their prayers and faith, upholding and including myself and my nieces in a wonderful caring bond of shared vision and understanding of life, and what it's for, and how best to make the journey. Many of the people there had watched me grow up and nurtured me in the faith, and, being back among them was moving and healing.

The emotional roller-coaster keeps hurtling along nonetheless...there is a vacancy in Lausanne and I am appointed Interim Moderator, which, as you might imagine, brings many responsibilities and tasks – not least, helping the congregation find a new minister, with all the arcane rules and procedures involved in that. From an emotional whirlpool right back into the nuts and bolts, forms and edicts that the church has, over the years, made the apparently necessary steps to take in order to call a new Minister. The people in Lausanne are a great bunch, hard-working and committed to the witness of their church. It will be a privilege to walk with them on this journey. It will take time, but it will need to be done.

However, all this will happen and be dealt with while enjoying a summer in Geneva – worshipping in the Auditoire and sharing the story of my days with the people of the Church of Scotland, Geneva. Not too shabby!!!

Caring for One Another

As we approach the summer months, we look forward to some time for recreation – and re-creation.



Holiday plans, often involving travel to faraway places, loom large on our agenda and in our minds but, at the same time, we are reminded too of the importance of staying in touch with those around us: our immediate families and friends, those whom we usually see daily or weekly but whom we may miss during the holiday period. Consider sending a postcard – or the latest tech equivalent, if that's appropriate – to your "neighbour" while you're gone, or phone them up or send a text message. It will be greatly appreciated by those from whom you are separated, even temporarily – especially if they are not able to go away for the "holidays".

Staying in touch with one another is of great importance, especially in this fast-changing world. Personal contact is essential for good well-being. Who usually sits close to you in church on Sunday morning? Do you know them by name? If not, why not introduce yourself next Sunday morning? If you do know someone who is usually there but seems to have been absent for the past couple of weeks, do you think to give them a call to say something like "Hi there. We missed you. Are you OK?" And, if the people sitting next to you next Sunday seem to be visitors - and we have many of them every week, especially during the summer - reach out to them and say, simply, "Welcome!"

In the Church of Scotland here in Geneva, we try to promote the idea of 'Caring for one another'. That means that 'caring' is not just the responsibility of the Minister or the Elders but of all of us who are called by Jesus to love another as we love ourselves (Matthew 22: 39).

Fête de la Musique, 2018

Every year, on Midsummer weekend, the Old Town area of Geneva goes a bit mad with the Fête de la Musique. This year is no exception.

The Fête will take place between Friday evening, 22 June and Sunday evening, 24 June. Every possible venue (including the Auditoire) and open space will be occupied by musicians of all ages and varieties from baroque and classical to hiphop and heavy metal. And it's all free!





Sunday morning is clear of Fête activities, and we shall hold our normal worship service at 11 as usual. However, car access to the Old Town will be severely restricted. If you have a "handicap" badge for your car, you will be able to come into the Old Town and use the designated parking spaces. <u>However, you will have to be out of the area (using the Rampe de la Treille and the Rue de la Corraterie – not Place Neuve) by 2 p.m.</u>

Others are asked to park outside the area, for example in the Parking St.-Antoine, and come on by foot.

We shall, of course, have a great musical offering in the Auditoire for our own service. So come to worship without fear, and enjoy the Fête afterwards!

A brief report from Graeme and Meena Clugston in Lalgadh

We have been with NLT/LLHSC for 11 years now. Thanks to you - your prayers, your funding and your encouraging support – LLHSC has seen a huge increase in patient numbers, increasing clinical compassionate care with free services for the leprosy- affected, increasing international visibility, and amazing infrastructure developments.

The hospital gets busier and busier as the hot weather approaches – it's around 40 degrees at Lalgadh each day now. At present we are managing 600 – 800 outpatients (patients coming for consultations) per day, and our nearly 100 Inpatient beds are full, our new Children's Unit is full, and our diagnostic services (laboratory, X-Ray, ultrasound, pharmacy) are stretched.

Opening our Children's Unit on World Leprosy Day (28 January 2018) was so amazingly appropriate. The World Health Organization (WHO) had declared "Children" as the major focus for 2018 World Leprosy Day worldwide, with goals -

- zero leprosy-disability in Children,
- zero Children with Leprosy

It has taken some 3 years to build our Children's Unit. It has been achieved through wonderful support - funds, encouragement, prayers - from churches and friends around the world, and an enthusiastic visionary building team here at LLHSC.



There are still some amazing finishing touches going on. For example we are painting the walls of the Children's Unit with Himalayan scenes – and with the help of a painter, **some of the leprosy** affected children inpatients are helping to paste an amazing array of multi-coloured animals on the walls. Mind-blowing!



Support for Ultra-needy schools in high remote earthquake-affected areas

Two weeks ago we went up to high areas of Sindhuli District, to help support a new needy school – Nakajuli School, and continue with support for an even higher remoter school – Kalika School, which is still badly earthquake affected.

We are helping build a new school at Kalika, but meantime are providing the children with school- clothes, schoolbags, reading and writing materials, books, soap and towels, toothbrush, sandals, and a snack. We are also installing solar panels, and have already helped put in a piped water-supply from a spring about 1 km away up the mountain-side.

We also run a health-check-up clinic at Kalika.... Firstly for the children, but then also for the parents. We are the first doctors to ever go there.

The trip getting there is initially a 2-hour winding, reasonable-road ascent to the top of the Sindhuli range, then another 1½ hour rough hair-raising road, only possible with a high-base land-rover. That gets us to Nakajuli School.

After Nakajuli School there is another ½-hour rough steep "road" to where the "road" finishes. Then it's a steep steep 1-hour climb on foot.... To reach Kalika School.

Some of the mothers and local young folks come down to help carry up the equipment we are bringing – the school equipment, the medical supplies for our clinic there, and the solar panels.
